Bali is an island in the Indonesian archipelago, about 350 mi (570 km) east of Java. Most of its coffee comes from the Kintamani region on the island's northeastern side. Here, smallholder farmers plant coffee trees alongside orange trees, chilis, and root plants like taro, potatoes and cassava. This intercropping, combined with the island's rich fertile volcanic soil, gives coffee its complexity and sweet flavors. The diversity of agricultural produce also provides additional income for their families throughout the year.

Coffee farmers on Bali are supported by the Starbucks Farmer Support Center (FSC) on nearby Sumatra. Our agronomists focus on training and sharing best practices that can help coffee farmers increase the yield of their harvests and maintain coffee farms for generations to come.
